What is SRT?

SRT is asthma treatment for children > 12 years. The inhaler contains quick acting, long lasting medicine to open your airways and preventer medicine to keep your lungs healthy.



- ❖ 1 puff should be taken as needed for symptoms such as wheeze or breathlessness.
- ❖ Your maximum daily dose is 8 puffs. If 8 puffs is needed for 2-3 days seek medical advice. Up to 12 puffs can be given in an emergency (see below).
- If you have an asthma attack or need SRT three or more times a week, see your GP or asthma nurse about taking an inhaler regularly as well as when needed.

How to treat asthma symptoms Are you wheezy and/or breathless? Are you working hard to breathe? No No need to do anything. Sit upright and try to stay calm. Continue to look for symptoms. Take 1 puff of your inhaler. Wait a few minutes. Take another puff if needed. No Do you still have symptoms? Yes Take 1 more puff. Wait a few minutes. Take more puffs if needed but not more than 6 at one time.

Call 999 or go straight to your local Emergency Department if you are not improving or need up to 12 puffs in 24 hours.

If you have a Salbutamol (blue) inhaler, give up to 10 puffs one at a time using a spacer whilst awaiting urgent help.
